He'll Do Whatever it Takes to Graduate



Tyler dreams of graduating from high school. As a senior, wanting to achieve that dream during this coronavirus pandemic makes him especially emotional.

Tyler has experienced homelessness and food insecurity while attending classes and keeping his grades up. The uncertainty of just how long the world will remain at a standstill makes it stressful and challenging.

He recently said, "I've never had someone to look up to. I want to be the first person in my family to graduate from high school.

I have to graduate. I don't want to struggle anymore."

What is it like for you to be homeless as a high school student? "For days I didn't have food. I didn't have anywhere to stay. I was sleeping at the park and when it was time for school, I would ask my girlfriend if I could take a shower."

Amid all of the worrying news, Tyler said HYC is a glimmer of hope.

"When I was younger, I always thought I would drop out. I've always been a lonesome thinker because for a long time I had to fend for myself ... No one had ever asked me what I needed. I used to steal food just so my family and I could eat ... So, when I get asked what I need it's new and weird but it feels great to know there is someone a phone call away."

With the help of HYC and its community supporters, Tyler and hundreds like him receive basic supplies and resources they need in these uncertain times.

Even with school not in session, Tyler said he isn't taking any chances to break away from his studies. Instead, he is focused on online learning and staying productive.

"I don't think people understand the amount of value a high school diploma has," he said. "When you go apply for that job, it makes you more qualified. It's worth it walking on that stage and seeing everyone congratulate you."

He added, "When I graduate, I want to make sure I give HYC a huge shout out."

During the COVID Crisis HYC is Adjusting

HYC has made changes to daily operations to keep our staff, donors, volunteers and our youth as safe as possible. At this time, HYC staff is working remotely and available via cell phone and email. Currently, our physical office is closed. Operations will continue with some modifications and HYC will still be providing services to our youth.

Generous Donors and Amazing Volunteers

HYC is very fortunate to have ongoing relationships with corporate, community and volunteer groups. This type of support is vital to providing services to HYC youth. Earlier this year, we received very generous donations from two local corporations, both long-time donors to HYC.

This massive undertaking couldn't have been accomplished without the help of HYC volunteers. Over the course of a week, nearly 60 volunteers helped unload three truckloads of items and unpacked dozens of boxes. Volunteers also spent countless hours sorting clothing, shoes and personal care products. Lastly, our volunteers "shopped" the now sorted items for each youth in our program, preparing more than 250 bags with new outfits.

Donations like these are an important part of HYC and make up a large portion of the resources we are able to provide to our youth. These items truly enhance the lives of the youth we serve. Whether it's a donation of clothes or personal hygiene products, the youth in our program are able to rely on corporations that care about their circumstances and want to give them a chance at a better life. We can't thank our donors enough for the support they continue to provide.



Help Homeless Youth in Arizona, Get Back from the State of Arizona

If you are a resident of Arizona, one of the easiest ways to make a difference in the lives of homeless youth is through the Arizona Charitable Tax Credit. This tax credit is a way for state taxpayers to redirect their state tax dollars to organizations and causes that are important to them. The state of Arizona provides an incredible incentive for taxpayers who donate to certain qualifying charities like HYC.

When you make a donation to HYC, you could receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit on your AZ state return – up to \$400 for individuals and \$800 for those filing jointly. Donate \$800 to HYC by April 15th and get \$800 right back in your AZ tax return. **HYC's Qualifying Charitable Tax Code is 20200.** Donors are required to use this code when taking the tax credit on their income tax returns.

Homelessness affects many youth in Arizona. Your support means youth won't have to experience the instability of homelessness.

A child can build a plan for his/her future in a supportive environment.

A child won't have to feel helpless and hopeless about his/her ability to be a student.

There are nearly 30,000 homeless youth in Arizona because of the lack of consistency, stability and safety. Most of the time, it's a result of circumstances beyond their control. In turn, they are without a stable home and homeless through no fault or choice of their own.

The consequences of homelessness are devastating. Many youth impacted by homelessness do what they have to do in order to survive – sleep in cars, barter sex for shelter, couch surf or live with an abusive family member. Your charitable donation for HYC will help Arizona homeless youth, 13 to 21 years of age, and qualifies for the Arizona Charitable Tax Credit.

Bottom line? You can either pay the state or you can help transform the lives of vulnerable, at-risk youth at no additional cost to you. Please take full advantage of this opportunity to help homeless youth. For more details, consult your tax professional.
